As the weather warms and we finally see signs of a future where schools and businesses are safely able to offer more in-person services, we at the National Runaway Safeline continue to deliver life-saving services to young people and their families. Even as we approach this hopeful benchmark, young people continue to struggle with weakened emotional supports, lack of contact with friends, and fewer places to reach out for help when needed. NRS is here for them, as a connection to critical resources and a listening ear.

This support is even more important as youth deal with the impact of racial violence sweeping across the nation. Actions speak louder than words, and NRS is committed to providing support to AAPI communities by sharing resources and messages of hope. Our vision of a world without youth homelessness is closely aligned with a world without racial discrimination and hate.

If you are looking for more information on youth focused organizations that specifically support the AAPI community, we recommend supporting and following the work of these organizations:

- <u>Project Lotus</u> Project Lotus is a youth-led organization focused on destigmatizing mental health in Asian-American communities by tackling the model minority stereotype through culturally-relevant education for the community and the empowerment of voices.
- <u>Dear Asian Youth</u> Dear Asian Youth was founded by Stephanie Hu, a 16-year-old who wished to create a platform to publish her poetry. It evolved into a blog dedicated to the Asian narrative, then a literary magazine, then a full-fledged organization with over 100 members on the national team.
- <u>AAPI Women Lead</u> AAPI Women Lead works to end racial and gender violence, specifically for
  Asians and Pacific Islanders, and in solidarity with Black, Indigenous, and other communities of
  color. They do this work through their Community Care Series, by funding youth-led mutual aid
  projects, by providing community resources, and more.

As always, we are here to offer free, confidential, non-judgmental services to young people and their families. Over the past year, our crisis services team members have fielded tens of thousands of contacts, each one with a unique story and background. Recognizing those stories and treating the people we serve as individuals is essential to providing effective services.

I urge you to have care, both for others and for yourself, as we navigate this challenging time.

Part of being an ally means resisting that urge to center yourself; instead, tend to the feelings of the person who is suffering and elevate other people."

**Sun Prairie, WI** | "Families without a home who 'double up' or pay for hotel rooms are becoming the invisible homeless, unable to get the help they need, advocates say.

But unlike homeless people who live on the streets or in a shelter, these families who stay on someone's couch or in cheap hotels, can't access homeless resources. Koester said that's because the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) prioritizes homeless people on the street and in shelters."
