Developed in collaboration with Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago and the Family and Youth Services Bureau (FYSB), this report features an analysis of voluntarily reported data collected from crisis contacts in 2022 as well as trends in NRS's social media activities. The findings provide critical information about the needs of youth who are experiencing homelessness or at risk of becoming homeless, how NRS and other youth-serving organizations can best meet the needs of youth in crisis and those who care about them, and when and how individuals engage with NRS on social media. 2022 Crisis Services & Prevention Report



The National Runaway Safeline's 2022 Crisis Services & Prevention Report, developed in collaboration with Chapin Hall at the University of Chicago and supported by the Family and Youth Services Bureau, delves into the data trends observed crisis and in intervention services. In a snapshot, over 4 million young people aged 13-25 experience homelessness annually in the U.S., emphasizing the critical need for NRS's 1-800-RUNAWAY hotline, text and online services. The report examines the demographics of those reaching out, prevalent issues such as family dynamics and mental health that warranted crisis intervention, referral options discussed, and the impact of NRS's social media engagement. Noteworthy trends postpandemic include shifts age demographics, contact methods, and presenting problems. NRS continues to play a vital role in providing crucial resources and support to youth facing crises or homelessness.

Research Brief: Perceived Life Expectancy and Life Purpose in LGBTQ+

Young People


The Trevor Project's study underscores the critical influence of perceived life expectancy and life purpose on the mental well-being of LGBTQ+ youth. Demographic variations in perceived life expectancy and its impact on mental health outcomes are highlighted, emphasizing the need for targeted interventions to address these factors. Additionally, the study establishes a positive relationship between life purpose and mental health, with higher life purpose correlating with lower rates of suicide attempts among LGBTQ+ youth.
